Below is a list of **categories** of <u>child-related work</u> that may apply to the child minding sector, where a person has a role that involves, or is likely to involve, **contact** with a child as part of their **usual duties**. The examples provided may also be subject to <u>exemptions</u>.

Frequently asked questions

Do parents need a Working with Children (WWC) Check to volunteer at their child's licensed child care centre?

Under category 1, parent **volunteers** are exempt from requiring a WWC Check if they are volunteering at the child care centre their child is enrolled in, including excursions. This includes general volunteering in the centre or on an excursion.

However, any person who has a current **Negative Notice** or **Interim Negative Notice** is not able to access the parent volunteer exemption. For further information refer to <u>Factsheet</u> <u>CRW04 – Exemptions</u>, <u>narrowing of access</u>.

My friend/relative looks after my child from time to time. Do they need a WWC Check?

If it is an informal arrangement between the relative/friend and yourself for a private or domestic purpose, then a WWC Check is not required. However, if you have a formal baby sitting or child care arrangement then a WWC Check is required.
