

About the Aboriginal Family Safety Grants

Grants:

- for Aboriginal Community Controlled Organisations (ACCOs) and registered Aboriginal not-for-profit businesses
- time-limited to support projects for up to two years (2024/25-2025/26)
- to deliver Aboriginal-led, place-based responses to family violence and
- have a funding allocation of \$6 million with a portion of this funding set aside for program evaluation.

Grant Program Aims

The aim of this grant program is to fund projects contributing to:

- 1) New and innovative Aboriginal and community-led family safety initiatives to prevent or respond to family violence and that align with one of the four Focus Areas of the Aboriginal Family Safety Strategy.
- 2) Local, place-based and Aboriginal-led solutions and actions to address family violence and prioritise safety.
- 3) Increasing the number of ACCOs and registered Aboriginal businesses that provide family violence supports and services across Western Australia.
- 4) Culturally secure evaluation to increase knowledge and evidence of Aboriginal-led approaches to family safety to inform future policy and service design.

Indicative Target Outcomes




- Improved availability and access to a range of culturally secure and Aboriginal-led programs and services across Western Australia that promote and support family safety.
- Aboriginal knowledge systems are centred in the design and delivery of family safety initiatives and in the collection and analysis of data for evaluation.
- ACCOs and registered Aboriginal businesses are strengthened to deliver
 preventative, healing and other initiatives to their communities designed to promote
 and support family safety.

Engagement summary

Timeline



June to October 2021

State-wide Aboriginal community engagement via 16 metropolitan and regional Aboriginal community engagement workshops



March to April 2022

Public consultation and targeted engagement on the draft consultation strategy



October to December 2021

Engagement with Aboriginal Community Controlled Organisations, Aboriginal stakeholders, Government, peak bodies and sector organisations



May 2022 onwards


Strategy finalised and endorsed

Reach

- 216 participants in metropolitan and regional Aboriginal community engagement workshops
- Over 150 key stakeholders engaged
- Over 130 responses received to an online survey for Aboriginal staff from the Department of Communities
- Aboriginal community engagement held across Goldfields, Pilbara, Midwest-Gascoyne, Wheatbelt, Kimberley, Southwest and Perth metropolitan regions
- Briefings with Aboriginal Advisory Council of WA, Aboriginal Health Council of WA and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Social Justice Commissioner
- 99 online survey responses to the consultation draft Strategy
- Targeted webinars, meetings, phone calls and emails with over 200 community members and stakeholders to share and seek feedback on the consultation draft Strategy

Our engagement builds on what we heard during previous consultation processes prior to 2021, including the Aboriginal Family Safety Summit, development of Path to Safety and the Aboriginal Cultural Capability Reform Program.

Aboriginal Family Safety Strategy



Implementation principles:

- Aboriginal-led
- Designed in partnership
- Place-based
- Responsive to different groups of people
- New and better ways of working

Aboriginal Family Safety Strategy Four Focus Areas



Focus area 1

Healing

Ensure healing is what guides prevention and the delivery of family violence services and practice

Services will be designed to:

- ensure that responses to family violence are holistic and trauma-informed to respond effectively to the intergenerational trauma that exists within Aboriginal communities.
- ensure those who experience family violence, including children and young people, are safe and supported to heal and recover.



Focus area 2

Recognise and support men and boys

Recognise the unique roles and responsibilities of men, boys and fathers and support them to build strong communities and safe families

Individuals and families will be empowered and responses reframed to:

- address the lack of specific support available for men, including for those who use violence.
- recognise the strong traditional role of men and fatherhood in Aboriginal cultures as central to any initiative designed to address family violence.
- ensure that a long-term approach to embedding family safety for Aboriginal children, people, families and communities is taken.

Aboriginal Family Safety Strategy Four Focus Areas (continued)



Focus area 3

Transform

Transform service provision and reform systems

Systems will be reformed to:

- respond to systemic racism and discrimination by building culturally informed and sensitive agencies, policies, procedures, and practices.
- build the cultural capability of Government agencies through creating career pathways at all levels for Aboriginal workers with a focus on recruiting and retaining Aboriginal staff in senior roles by specifying 50D positions where appropriate and aligning with Aboriginal workforce strategic frameworks.
- normalise the inclusion of Aboriginal cultural responses within those systems, which prioritise safety and accountability through localised decision-making.
- reform funding models to prioritise preventative measures and improve access to justice for Aboriginal families experiencing family violence.
- implement evaluative measures that are overseen by community leaders to ensure community are seeing positive changes.



Focus area 4

Aboriginal-led prevention and early intervention

Use culture as the frame for delivering primary prevention and early intervention programs

Early intervention and prevention approaches will be embedded to:

- strengthen culture and identity as a foundational and baseline response to family violence.
- build on the strengths and complex systems that Aboriginal families and communities already utilise and benefit from.
- positively reinforce cultural roles and responsibilities within families and communities – for men, boys, women and girls.
- · support localised decision-making structures.
- address the social determinants that lead to family violence.

Alignment to the Strategy



Can your proposed project demonstrate:

- How the initiative relates to the Strategy?
- Support from or consultation with the community for the initiative?
- How project makes a difference to family safety and the community?

Addendum on Tenders WA



- Recent request for data related to demonstrating project need.
- It was not Communities intention to imply that data or statistics are required to demonstrate the need for your project.
- A preferred response to this criterion will provide evidence of why the project is needed in the community.

Evidencing Project Need

Evidence might include but is not limited to:

- Existing organisational data.
- Anecdotal examples (e.g. from services, community members, clients, staff, etc).
- Results from consultation with community.
- Support from Elders.
- Description of current trends in the community.
- Examples of community desire to address the need.

Data Sources

Existing data sources that are accessible to the public include the <u>Australian Bureau of Statistics</u> and <u>WA Police – Crime Statistics</u>.

Aboriginal Family Safety Strategy

Aboriginal Family Safety Strategy 2022-2032 sets out a cross-government initiative for addressing family violence impacting Aboriginal women, children, families and communities.

Last updated: 18 April 2024

Aboriginal people experience family violence at disproportional-lify high rates with devactating impacts on their own health and wellbeing, and on the health and wellbeing of their families and community. The contributing factors to family violence in Aboriginal communities are different to non-Aboriginal communities, and include colonization, dispossession, intergenerational trauma and racism.

In December 2022, we baunched the Aborigmal Family Safety Strategy 2022-2002 (the Strategy) as part of the State Governments response to Outcome 15 of the National Agreement on Closing the Gap – that Aborigmal and Tones Strati Islander families and households are safe, it is also a priority action of Path to Safety Western Australian (WA) strategy to reduce family and domestic violence 2020–2000.

We understand that the outcome of Aborigmal family safety is underpinned by Aborigmal-fied action and solutions and holds Aborigmal values, beliefs, outliare, identity and knowledge systems at the heart of holds to responses.



Aboriginal Family Safety Strategy

The Department of Communities are developed the Aboriginal Family Strategy seth Aboriginal people and communities to address family vidence impacting Aboriginal families and softmunities.



Aboriginal Family Safety Grants

Grant Funding of \$5.75 million is being made available for Aborginal and portraunity-led initiatives that prevent or recond to family volence throughout Western Australia.
