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# **Minister's foreword**

This is my first WA Industry Link Annual Report that I have the pleasure of presenting to the Parliament.

I became Minister for State Development, Jobs and Trade following the March 2021 election, inheriting this portfolio from the Premier. In my time in this role, I have been greatly impressed by what has been achieved since the introduction of the *Western Australian Jobs Act 2017* (WA Jobs Act) in December 2017.

These achievements include the development and implementation of the Western Australian Industry Participation Strategy (WAIPS) that introduced enhanced access to opportunities for local small to medium sized enterprises (SMEs) to participate in state government procurement. WAIPS also introduced uniform procurement policy coverage across state agencies, including Government Trading Entities (GTEs) and improved awareness of the economic and business impact of the \$30 billion per annum agency expenditure.

Since the full implementation of WAIPS in October 2018, it is estimated that 41,113 Western Australian jobs, including 2,773 apprentices and 89.95 per cent of local sourcing have been achieved to 30 June 2021. These jobs have been made possible by the high levels of cooperation the Department of Jobs, Tourism, Science and Innovation (the department) has received from both agencies and suppliers; both in adopting WAIPS process and in appreciating the government's purpose of linking expenditure to general economic outcomes and jobs.

This relationship between expenditure and general economic outcomes and jobs became even more crucial in 2020-21 due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. The state government, in maintaining employment and business activity, introduced a range of major stimulus packages whose success depended on the appropriate functioning of WAIPS. Equally, in actioning commitments outlined in the WA Jobs Plan (February 2021), the WAIPS process is critical to the success of many of these initiatives in generating on-going escalation in employment and business activity.

The ongoing delivery of WAIPS is supported by a commitment to upgrade and enhance the strategy on an annual basis, to effect improvements in both content and approach. Feedback and input from agencies and business help assist this process.

The Regional Communication Forums (forums) held across Western Australia are an important source of feedback from participants in this regard and a number of enhancements enacted are directly attributable to inputs received at these forums.

During 2020-21, these enhancements included a greater emphasis on the operation of Common Use Arrangements (CUA) and Agency Panel Contracts particularly in terms of participation of regional suppliers.

The department also initiated training for regional SMEs on doing business with state government agencies, while a focus on forecasting future demand and local participation in state grants for capital projects was introduced.

Feedback from agencies and suppliers on these initiatives has been positive, for example, there has been a 25 per cent increase in agencies using the 'Early Tender Advice' section of the Tenders WA web page, while a number of GTEs are using a similar approach on their web sites.

An important consideration for 2020-21 was the need to ensure ongoing correlation between the provisions of the WA Jobs Act, WAIPS and the Western Australian Buy Local Policy 2020 that was launched by the Premier in July 2020.

The WA Buy Local Policy covers procurement below the WAIPS thresholds, with the same intent of ensuring maximum use by agencies of competitive local suppliers. This WA Buy Local Policy, for which I am also responsible, has a strong focus on achieving positive regional outcomes.

A further initiative during the year, was the introduction of the *Procurement Act 2020* and the related Western Australian Procurement Rules, launched in June 2021. The Department of Finance is responsible for administering the procurement rules, while there has been a requirement to ensure functionality with WAIPS. The procurement rules focus on ensuring agencies' procurement processes are aligned.

WAIPS and the WA Buy Local Policy work to ensure that local industry is given full, fair and reasonable opportunity to participate in the state agency market.

# **Executive summary**

The WA Jobs Act and WAIPS have a significant and varied number of aspects to their implementation.

The department maintains and populates the WA Industry Link Portal through which policy guidance is provided to agencies and prospective suppliers in addition to promoting forums, events and other related initiatives. This advice on the operation of WAIPS and the opportunities it presents is supplemented through meetings and briefings with individual businesses, various industry associations and state agencies.

In 2020-21, 18 forums were undertaken across Western Australia. The forums play a critical role in informing regional SMEs about contracting opportunities, enabling them to be better prepared when bidding to supply to the state's estimated annual \$30 billion spend on goods, services and works. Forum locations included Broome and Derby in the Kimberley through to Carnarvon and Geraldton, Northam in the Wheatbelt and in the southern half of the state; Mandurah, Bunbury, Albany, Esperance and Kalgoorlie. The forums were delivered despite limitations imposed by COVID-19, and were strongly supported by agencies with a significant regional presence, such as the Departments of Finance; Communities; Primary Industries and Regional Development; Main Roads; and the port authorities.

The contribution of the Local Content Advisers Network was also crucial to the success of the forums, in both attendance and constructive input.

A further dimension to WAIPS is the strategic project initiative. The METRONET Railcar Program, as the first strategic project, achieved a significant milestone with the official opening of its Bellevue manufacturing facility by the Premier on 7 June 2021.

As part of the WA Jobs Plan, a second strategic project was selected; this being the acquisition of stand-alone power systems by the state's energy GTEs. The government's objective is that these systems should be manufactured locally.

A key factor for the success of WAIPS is that Western Australia possesses a competitive supply base that meets the majority of the needs of state agencies. This is borne out by consistently highlevels of local participation captured by WAIPS since October 2018. The government is committed to ensure this relationship is both maintained and enhanced in the public-sector market, and also in supply to other major markets.

To this end, the functioning of the department's Local Capability Fund (LCF) is central. The LCF aims to assist local SMEs to improve their capacity, capability and competiveness to supply goods, services and works to the government, major projects and other important markets.

There were seven rounds of the LCF in 2020-21 resulting in funding being provided to 141 Western Australian businesses.

The LCF played an important role in supporting local businesses impacted by COVID-19, with the government announcing a record \$12 million funding for the program in 2020-21.

## **Industry Link Advisory Service**

## Western Australian Industry Participation Strategy (WAIPS)

Over the 2020-2021 period, 216 Participation Plans supported an estimated creation of 18,512 Western Australian jobs, including 4,972 regional jobs.

Around 1,311 Western Australian apprenticeships and traineeships were estimated to be created during this period. In terms of contract award, 91.62 per cent of contract value was reported as Western Australian content.

## Western Australian Buy Local Policy 2020

Following extensive consultation with agencies, industry associations and suppliers, the WA Buy Local Policy was launched by the Premier in Kalgoorlie in July 2020.

A unique feature of the WA Buy Local Policy is the use of agency implementation agreements that outline an agency's commitment to the application of the policy. The first agreement was signed on 12 August 2020 between the department and the Department of Finance.


During the period, 19 agencies signed their WA Buy Local Policy Implementation Agreement with the department's Director General, including GTEs.

## The WA Industry Link Portal

Over the past 12 months, the portal has been accessed a total of 48,955 sessions. It is pleasing to note that this is up 36.5 per cent from last year. The most accessed pages include the LCF, Participation Plans and the WAIPS page.

The portal continues to act as a critical mechanism for both suppliers and agencies in understanding important government initiatives including the WAIPS, the WA Buy Local Policy and accessing funding opportunities like the LCF.

## Implementation Working Groups

Interaction with members of the Implementation Working Groups covered the provision of advice on the WA Buy Local Policy, which was released on 3 July 2020; queries from agencies concerning the development of an implementation agreement; LCF updates; forums feedback; inviting agency involvement in the training program being delivered to regional SMEs; and coverage of WAIPS issues, such as reporting and participation plan matters.

Due to the effective functioning of WAIPS with key spending agencies, there has been an ability to reduce the frequency of formal meetings. Contact is maintained through day-to-day communication.

## Local Capability Fund (LCF) recipient write ups

#### Metropolitan

Blacktree Technology (COVID-19 **Business Recovery and Growth Round)** - two new contracts valued at \$3.05 million. four new staff Blacktree Technology is a Perth based small business that designs, manufactures, installs, and maintains high specification UHF SATCOM products and systems to the Australian defence sector and exports to European and US based defence customers. The COVID-19 pandemic meant that a number of their projects were cancelled or put on hold due to the inability to travel. As a result, they saw a 58 per cent reduction in turnover and were unable to continue pre-pandemic levels of investment in equipment and expertise to maintain their growth.

The company received \$93,621.43 in funding under the COVID-19 Business Recovery and Growth Round for assistance with the development of tendering processes, procedures and documentation, and the purchase of prototyping and manufacturing equipment. Through these activities the business sought to increase the production and maintenance capabilities of their workshop which would add the specific benefit for prototyping new products for Defence applications.

Since receiving the funding, the business has reported that they have won two new government contracts and have brought on four new staff.

CADDS Group (COVID-19 Business Recovery and Growth Round) – five new contracts valued at \$1.85 million, four new staff, two new apprentices CADDS Group is a Perth based mediumsized multidisciplinary engineering and design consultancy business which provides services to the mining and

government sectors. The business provides six core services: engineering, surveying, architecture, fabrication, product innovation, and energy, through a concept-to-completion service.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the company's pipeline of work reduced dramatically and lead to a 23 per cent reduction in turnover and all staff having their working hours reduced by 20 to 60 per cent.

The business was successful under the COVID-19 Business Recovery and Growth Round and received \$100,000 to purchase laser scanners and specialised processing computers to position them to grow in the mining sector. The funding allowed the business to continue their technical investment which had been constrained by the pandemic.

Since receiving the funding, the company has reported that they have won five new contracts in the mining sector, and brought on four new staff and two new apprentices.



#### Regional

Indigenous Professional Services (Aboriginal Business Round) - 50 new contracts, total of \$1 million value, 15 new staff

Indigenous Professional Services is a majority Indigenous owned South West medium-sized business that provides professional consultancy services to the construction, Defence, government, media, mining, oil and gas, and education sectors.

They deliver organisational development and leadership, research and evaluation, business advisory, and Indigenous engagement and project services to their clients.

The company received funding under the Aboriginal Business Round in 2020-21 and had previously been successful in the Regional Aboriginal Business Round in 2018/19. Under the Aboriginal Business Round, Indigenous Professional Services received \$41,776.80 to purchase audio/ video, computer and teleconferencing equipment to increase their capability for remote delivery and access.

Since receiving funding for the 2020-21 Aboriginal Business Round, the business has reported that they have won 50 new contracts and have brought on 15 new staff.



Andast (COVID-19 Business Recovery and Growth Round) - 4 new contracts, total of \$980k value, 2 new staff

Andast Pty Ltd- The Ag Shop is a Wheatbelt small business, servicing suppliers to the agricultural, mining, and industrial sectors. The business was significantly impacted by COVID-19, finding a large decrease in sales and a 40 per cent reduction in turnover.

The business was successful under the COVID-19 Business Recovery and Growth Round and received \$42,765 to purchase a customized tandem axle trailer.

Through purchasing the new equipment, the business sought to increase their capacity to service current clients and compete with larger companies, to gain new contracts and keep business in the local community.

## Media and communications

The department's WA Industry Link communications approach continued to play a critical role informing stakeholders on a range of government initiatives, including the WAIPS and the WA Buy Local Policy.

The LCF enabled 45 businesses to share in a total of \$2 million to improve their ability to supply to major WA Government projects. A further 96 recipients shared in an extra \$10 million to assist with COVID-19 recovery, and to explore potential supply opportunities for Personal Protective Equipment.

To achieve these broad outcomes the approach focused on:

- maintaining and updating the portal with essential information for WA businesses and agencies
- providing a range of training and information sessions to agencies and businesses
- » creating and participating in a number of events to maximise reach to stakeholders
- » a strong social media presence and a regular e-newsletter
- » media engagement.

#### Media engagement

WA Industry Link continued to use widespread and effective communication channels to promote new government initiatives and enhancements to key government policies including WAIPS and the WA Buy Local Policy.

As part of the government's commitment to continually improve WAIPS, it was refined and enhanced to simplify processes for both the contracting agencies and prospective suppliers with the intent of creating better outcomes for WA businesses and, in turn, communities.

The WA Buy Local Policy was promoted through various communication channels. The policy is expected to support an extra 3,000 regional jobs and more than 200 apprenticeships and traineeships during the first 12 months of operation.

The WA Buy Local Policy ensures state government agencies prioritise local businesses that are based in the regional locations in which the work or service is being delivered.

#### **Regional Communication Forums**

As part of the government's commitment to job creation and regional development, the department delivered a record 18 Regional Communication Forums across regional WA during the year.

The forums continue to play an important role in informing regional SMEs of contracting opportunities, enabling them to be better prepared when bidding to supply to the WA Government's estimated annual \$30 billion spend on goods, services and works.

More than 600 regional stakeholders registered for the events that provided SMEs with important information on

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government initiatives, including the WAIPS, the WA Buy Local Policy and the department's successful funding program, the LCF.

These strategies and funding strive to deliver opportunities for Western Australian businesses and workers and ensure they are maximised when it comes to supplying to government, including benefits to regional Western Australia.

The forums were highly successful, with 96 per cent of survey respondents stating they found the information at the events helpful.

In the short period of three years, the forums have become an important means of delivering information on supply opportunities between government agencies and regional businesses. Feedback received from previous forums has helped shape the development of the WA Buy Local Policy, while contributing to the on-going development and enhancement of the WAIPS.

#### **Events**

Last financial year, the department helped deliver the Government's Pipeline of Work stimulus, which was launched by the Premier in November 2020. Approximately 700 SMEs participated in this event. The critical Pipeline of Work, worth \$27.1 billion over the next four years, is part of the government's approach to create jobs for Western Australians and stimulate the economy.

One of the key features of the pipeline initiative is local businesses having access to information that will give them time to build their capacity and capability to bid for work.

The enhancements to the WAIPS 2020, was also announced at the event, which continues as a key means of ensuring WA businesses receive a bigger share of work by maximising supply opportunities.

The department again played a key role at the Australasian Oil and Gas Exhibition and Conference (AOG) 2021 in Perth, with the WA Industry Link, WAIPS and the WA Jobs Act promoted at the two-day conference. The department continued its ongoing partnership with AMC Management (WA) Pty Ltd to exhibit and promote the theme "Local content and local jobs for Western Australians".

To reflect the innovative and changing environment of the oil and gas industry, the event has been rebranded as AOG Energy. The event's Forward Work Plans provide local SMEs with detailed information on current and future opportunities in the industry and continue to receive industry support and recognition.

## Strategic project

## **METRONET** Railcar Program

#### **Contracting agency**

Public Transport Authority

#### **Progress update**

In December 2019, Alstom was awarded the contract to deliver the METRONET Railcar Program. As a strategic project under the WA Jobs Act, the contract requires Alstom to meet the target of 50 per cent local (WA) content for the manufacturing of the new railcars in Western Australia.

Construction of the new railcar manufacturing facility in Bellevue was completed by WA company Firm Construction and opened on 7 June 2021 by Premier Mark McGowan and Minister for Transport Rita Saffioti, with METRONET and Alstom leadership.

Alstom has now commenced the fit-out of the site, with the support of WA companies such as CAMCO and Chess Engineering. More than 80 full-time Alstom employees are currently working in Bellevue towards the manufacturing of the railcars. Every month, an additional 10



to 15 employees will start work, with up to 200 people to be reached before mid-2022. In parallel, agreements were finalised with the North Metropolitan TAFE for a training program for all newly employed electricians.

In addition, major contracts were signed with suppliers for the supply of railcar components with significant (WA) local content. Among others, Hofmann Engineering will provide bogie frames from 2022; McConnell will provide passenger seats and is currently in the process of setting up their new premises in WA.

International supplier KNORR-Bremse will manufacture and supply the air conditioning units. From their WA premises, AERISON will provide metallic sub-assemblies, Austbreck will assemble the pantographs in WA, and the coupler supplier DELLNER will use WA subcontractors for many sub-components.

# **Project summaries**

## **Metropolitan**

#### **Project: Hill 60 Bank Remediation**

Agency: Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage Awarded Supplier: MMM WA Pty Ltd Supplier Region: Metropolitan

Actual Workforce (All WA): 79 Local Content% (All WA): 100% Contract Value: \$4,050,616

Hill 60, a steep foreshore bank on the Swan River, is located at Lot 809 Tanunda Drive, Rivervale.

The steep bank and its ongoing erosion presented an unacceptable risk to infrastructure adjacent to the site (including walkways and residential apartment buildings), and hence the Hill 60 Bank Remediation Project was undertaken to provide a long-term solution to stabilise the bank.

In 2017, the Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage (DPLH) engaged M P Rogers & Associates Pty Ltd to undertake investigations and design works to identify key issues at the site and develop a long-term solution to remediate these issues. Over the period from 2017 to 2019, with the assistance of geotechnical consultants, concept through to detailed design and documentation were undertaken for the Hill 60 Bank Remediation. In 2019, MMM Pty Ltd (MMM) was awarded the contract to construct the remediation works. These works broadly included clearing of a temporary access track to the base of the





bank, the construction of a rock revetment toe berm (including clearing of vegetation, placement of granite aggregate, geotextile fabric, limestone filter rock and limestone armour rock), clearing and regrading of the bank to a stable slope, placement and compaction of fill to achieve the required slope along the length of the bank, revegetation and landscape works and grout permeation under the walkway at the top of the slope to prevent any undermining.

DPLH formed a strong working relationship with MMM and was highly satisfied with the project outcomes achieved and the standard of work delivered. The project featured a number of inherent complexities and required considerable stakeholder consultation and liaison which MMM delivered without issue. In addition to this. MMM was able to deliver on the objectives of WAIPS, being a local Perth business, and utilising other local subcontractors and suppliers in delivering these works. As part of the project, they provided a number of trainee opportunities, including for Indigenous students from Clontarf College.



## **Kimberley**

#### Project: North Regional TAFE Broome – NDIS Training Facility

The construction of a new special built facility/house to train people providing care to persons with disabilities or age-related immobility.

The facilities were handed over for use in July 2020.

## Pilbara

#### Project: Port Hedland Administration Building Refurbishment

Agency: Pilbara Ports Authority Awarded Supplier: H & M Tracey Construction Pty Ltd Supplier Region: Pilbara

Actual Workforce (All WA): 154 Local Content% (All WA): 100% Contract Value: \$3,760,068

The original Pilbara Ports Authority (PPA) administration building located at Port Hedland was constructed in the late 1960s. Extensions to the building were completed in 2003 and 2009, however, despite this work, there was insufficient space within the building to accommodate all staff and demountable buildings were used for various functions such as information technology and finance teams. As the building's services, including air conditioning and electrical systems, were outdated, cabling infrastructure did not comply with modern standards and, with increasing maintenance costs for services and roofing, PPA issued a public tender for refurbishment of the building to restore and improve its functionality and compliance, accommodate the additional employees required by PPA, as well as providing a more cohesive work environment by relocating staff from external demountable buildings into the main building.

The refurbishment included installation of a new roof, provision of meeting rooms, reconfiguring the main entrance, removing existing walls and installing new partition walls and doors in addition to new cabinets, fixtures and ablutions, kitchen and amenities areas.

Improving systems was also part of the refurbishment work, relating to new lighting, electrical/data infrastructure, an IT control room and upgraded air conditioning system to bring the building into compliance with modern standards.

A public tender was published through Tenders WA and following completion of the tender process, the contract was awarded to H & M Tracey Constructions Pty Ltd (HMT) at a cost of approximately

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\$3.7 million. HMT is a majority Aboriginal owned (51 per cent) construction company, which was established in 2000 with the Head Office located in Perth and regional offices in Karratha, Broome and Derby. HMT is also registered with the Aboriginal Business Directory Western Australia and Supply Nation's Indigenous Business Directory.

Practical completion of the project was achieved on 20 December 2020 and the final WAIPS report submitted by HMT noted that 70 per cent of the actual contract spend was in regional WA with the balance in metro WA and with a 100 per cent WA workforce.

#### Gascoyne

#### Project: Gascoyne Research Station, Carnarvon – Retractable Roof Cooling House

Agency: Department of Finance Client Agency: Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development Awarded Supplier: Ningaloo Development Pty Ltd Supplier Region: Gascoyne

Actual Workforce (All WA): 19 Local Content% (All WA): 100% Contract Value: \$575,964



The project was an upgrade/refurbishment of the existing research facility that will allow researchers to examine how the Gravo greenhouse can be used to optimise production of the main vegetables crops that are grown in the district. The roof structure can be open to take full advantage of the sun and shut when there is heat stress, rainfall, high pest pressures and low temperatures to protect the plants.

The research will provide an insight into potential yields and quality, as well as pest and disease pressures on the crops.

The facilities were handed over for use in October 2020.

## **Mid-West**

#### **Project: Provision of Roadworks** Services within WA – Mid West

Agency: Main Roads WA Awarded Supplier: Central Earthmoving Company Supplier Region: Mid-West

Estimated total Workforce (All WA): 49 Estimated total Apprentices & Trainees (All WA): 4 Local Content% (All WA): 100% Contract Value: \$12,652,961 Anticipated completion date: 10/09/2021

The Minilya-Exmouth and Burkett Road Shoulder widening works were successfully delivered by Central Earthmoving.

Central Earthmoving's scope of works included widening to 9 metres, 42 kilometres of the formation and seal on Minilya-Exmouth Road and the widening the seal only on Burkett Road from the North West Coastal Highway intersection to Minilya-Exmouth Road intersection.


The Minilya–Exmouth Road works commenced approximately 12 kilometres north of the Coral Bay Road intersection through to 3 kilometres north of Burkett Road intersection. Minilya-Exmouth widening works included earthworks to



widen the formation and bitumen stabilisation of the widened pavement.

The shoulders were sealed for the entire 78 kilometres of Burkett Road between floodway sections, which were 9 metres wide.

The widened sealed pavement to a total width of 9 metres comprising of a 3.5 metre wide carriageway and a 1 metre sealed shoulder both directions with both painted and audible edge



lines delivers improved safety and reduced fatigue to road users.

Central Earthmoving successfully engaged personnel and businesses from the local area to deliver the project, where both Aboriginal people and businesses where significantly represented.

## **Goldfields Esperance**

#### Project: Construction of 10 Sole Occupancy Units, Admin & Communal at Lot 501 (13) Davidson St South Kalgoorlie

Construction of this facility includes ten residential units, a shared kitchen area, with an administration and reception facility with a surrounding landscaped garden.

The design of the facility promotes interactive areas and some fully accessible units to accommodate all client requirements, inclusive of native gardens and therapeutic spaces.



A contract was awarded to Acorp Construction in January 2020 with the project reaching completion in January 2021.

The successful tender recipient is a Kalgoorlie-based company who utilise local businesses and suppliers to support the local industry and economy.

Regional sub-contractors engaged included landscaping professionals, painters, electricians, bricklayers, plumbers, carpenters and utilised local providers for earthworks and glazing.

This project also supported local apprentices and trainees and successfully achieved Aboriginal employment outcomes.



#### Wheatbelt

#### **Project: WACHS – Narrogin Health Service Helicopter Landing Site**

The fundamental objective of the project was to improve the transport of critically ill patients in the Wheatbelt area from Narrogin Health Service to Perth using Helicopter Emergency Medical Service (HEMS) flights. HEMS provide the quickest way of transferring patients to a major trauma centre, tertiary acute hospital or specialist care to increase survival rates.

The facilities were handed over for use in November 2020.

Construction update: currently in defects liability period. Scheduled for final completion in November 2021.

#### Project: Mandurah Station – Multi-Storey Car Park

Mandurah Station is an end-of-line station, servicing a large potential catchment area that is currently characterised by generally low-density land use.

While Transperth provides an effective bus network across the region using Mandurah Station as a central hub, the majority of rail passengers (over 70 per cent) currently access the station via car (either as a driver, passenger or being dropped off).

Maintaining the effectiveness of station car parking by providing sufficient capacity is therefore an important contributor to the ongoing accessibility of the station and the wider transport





network – especially as demand is forecast to significantly grow over the next 12 years.

The proposed multi-storey car park will increase the total number of bays by a target of around 800 bays from 1,100 bays to 1,900 bays. The increase in the number of bays will continue to provide accessibility to the station for rail and bus users to meet projected demand until at least 2031.

The multi-storey car park will be located within the northern section of the

existing Mandurah car park which is bounded by the Bus Depot on the north, the Bus Depot Access Road on the east, Galgoyl Road on the west and the existing car park entry road aligned with Quendamia Lane.

The project will be similar to the Edgewater Multi-Storey Car Park delivered by the Public Transport Authority in 2016.

The Mandurah multistorey car park is nearing completion and is expected to be open to the public in the latter part of 2021.

#### **Great Southern**

#### Project: North Albany Senior High School and Albany Secondary Education Support Centre Additions and Improvements

Supplier Region: Great Southern

Actual Workforce (All WA): 236 Local Content% (All WA): 100% Contract Value: \$9,109,717

The project was an upgrade of existing building facilities and fire services at Albany Secondary Education Support Centre and North Albany Senior High School, and construction of a new double storey classroom block comprising six general learning classrooms and two science laboratories.

The facilities were handed over for use in April 2021.

#### Works progress update 2020-21

Construction update: currently in defects liability period. Scheduled for final completion in early 2022. Local content activities for 2020-21 Final regional WA content was approximately 86 per cent of the value of the contract.

#### Handover

Handover was in April 2021.



## Bunbury Outer Ring Road update

The Bunbury Outer Ring Road (BORR) is the biggest infrastructure project to be undertaken in the South West and is being constructed by the South West Gateway Alliance consortium comprising Acciona, NRW Contracting, MACA Civil, AECOM and Aurecon, along with Main Roads WA. The Alliance was awarded the \$852 million project to construct a 27 kilometre, four-lane, high-standard road in October 2020.

The BORR will connect Forrest Highway in Australind to Bussell Highway in Dalyellup, greatly improving road safety, freight capacity, efficiency and productivity across the region.

Unlocking local jobs and economic benefits has been a priority for the project from the outset, with Main Roads WA setting a Local Content target of \$300 million and an Aboriginal business procurement target of \$20 million. The project also has an Aboriginal employment target of 60 FTEs.

As part of meeting these targets, Main Roads WA and the Department of



Primary Industries and Regional Development's (DPIRD) Local Content Adviser Network collaborated to appoint a dedicated Local Content Adviser (LCA) to the BORR. The BORR LCA is based at the South West Development Commission and the Alliance's Community Hub in Bunbury and is working across local industry and the Alliance to connect local suppliers and contractors to the project.

The aim through the partnership is to maximise local business participation in order to create work opportunities for South West subcontractors and suppliers, and also to support industry sustainability and capability through engagement on the BORR.

Since commencement of the project, the Alliance and South West local businesses have engaged with employment development programs such as South Regional TAFE's Infrastructure Ready Skill Set Program and the Commonwealth's Construction Ready for Work program, with more employment initiatives upcoming throughout 2022 and 2023.

## Western Australia Police Force – New twin engine helicopter project

Jandakot based aviation company. Helicopter Logistics, has been appointed by Airbus Asia Pacific Limited as their Western Australian network partner to provide Airbus with local support capability in the delivery and operation of a new twin engine helicopter to the WA Police Force. Airbus was awarded the contract by WA Police Force in June 2020 as part of a competitive tender process which included a WAIPS Participation Plan as part of the evaluation. Airbus' WAIPS Participation Plan detailed a number of industry engagement commitments including this WA network partnership to bring Airbus' current eastern state aviation support arrangements to Western Australia

Support provided by Helicopter Logistics at their Jandakot facility will include capacity to implement and provide maintenance support for the H145 helicopter as required across the life of the contract. This network partnership includes the training of two



Licensed Aircraft Maintenance Engineers as new employees of Helicopter Logistics, with the potential for additional employees as required.

Helicopter Logistics will also have the opportunity to participate in the provision of support to Airbus military helicopter fleets as they operate in Western Australia.

This appointment of a Western Australian organisation to introduce local industry capability and promote increased WA job opportunities is an example of how the Government continues to deliver on the objectives within the WA Jobs Act through WAIPS.

# Initiatives

## Training

The need for SME training on how to sell to state government was a regular item of feedback received from the forums and this initiative was incorporated into the WAIPS 2020, the WA Buy Local Policy and the WA Recovery Plan.

A program of 'Doing Business with Government' workshops, for delivery to SMEs in regional Western Australia, was developed by the department and delivered by a facilitator.

Two successful pilot workshops were undertaken in Pinjarra on 20 April 2021 and Northam on 4 May 2021. A decision to progress to full program implementation followed from this success.

## **Pipeline of Work**

The Pipeline of Work initiative was launched by the Premier in November 2020.

The intention of the pipeline is to provide prospective suppliers with early notice of forthcoming state projects, particularly in relation to higher value infrastructure tenders. This advanced knowledge is to assist businesses in preparing bids in terms of capacity and workforce availability.

As the pipeline covers a four-year cycle, this gives businesses the ability to adjust scheduling and introduce training if required. The pipeline covers an estimated \$27.1 billion of projects located in both metropolitan and regional Western Australia.

The introduction of the pipeline has been welcomed by a range of industry and business associations as a valuable planning mechanism. The data collected is also assisting the management of demand, during a period of high activity.

The department promoted awareness and use of the government's pipeline at the forums conducted post-November 2020, and received positive responses from attendees.

## WA Jobs Plan initiatives

Introduced in February 2021, the WA Jobs Plan outlines the government's second term priorities in relation to employment, skilling and economic diversification.

As with the WA Recovery Plan initiated in July 2020, the WA Jobs Plan places reliance on the WA Jobs Act and the WAIPS to realise the local benefits of the government's procurement commitments outlined in the plan.

The WA Jobs Plan aims to create 125,000 jobs through projects such as METRONET, the manufacture of iron ore railcar wagons and componentry, build stand-alone power systems locally and production of wind farm turbines in WA.

Other priority areas include green steel, carbon farming, film production and food technology.

A further element is the planned establishment of the WA Jobs Taskforce, chaired by the Premier, which will have a focus on local industry participation in both public and private projects.



#### **Stand-alone power systems**

Among the actions included in the WA Jobs Plan, is the declaration of the purchase of stand-alone power systems by GTEs as a Strategic Project under the WA Jobs Act.

These battery powered distributed energy resources can be utilised both within and outside the integrated systems and are an important aspect of the move towards renewable power supply.

Western Power plans to acquire 900 such systems over five years, with Horizon Power likely to secure a further 150.

Designation as a Strategic Project allows an increased emphasis to be given to local assembly/manufacture of these items within the tender process, thereby encouraging potential suppliers to maximise input from WA.

The WA Jobs Act is therefore linked to the state's Future Battery and Critical Minerals Industries Strategy under the common objective of economic diversification and developing local capability through new forms of production.

## Local Government interest in alignment with WAIPS

The department, as the lead agency for WAIPS, has offered through the Western Australian Local Government Association (WALGA) to assist the provision of advice and support, with review and revision of procurement policies administered by Local Government Authorities.

## Edith Cowan University City Campus

The agreement negotiated to establish the Perth Edith Cowan University (ECU) City Campus includes a commitment for construction contracting to be undertaken utilising the WAIPS approach, in terms of Participation Plans and outcome reporting. Additionally, as a consequence of the state's provision of a grant for this project, reporting across all aspects will be provided following the completion of the project.

#### **ICT procurement**

During 2020-21, the state established an ICT Consultative Forum made up of peak industry bodies and relevant state agencies. The forum meets on a quarterly basis and has included Ministerial attendance. With the state government as a significant customer of ICT goods and services, this has been an ongoing topic of discussion, as have other crucial issues such as skilling and the growing influence of digital technology application.

### Social Procurement Framework alignment

In April 2021, the state government released the Western Australian Social Procurement Framework initiative that acts to link procurement activity to economic and community outcomes. These outcomes include employment and training opportunities, support for Aboriginal business, increased regional jobs and realisation of environmental benefits. In this way the framework becomes central to the effective functioning of the Value for Money principle by establishing clear priorities for achievement.

The framework covers the Aboriginal Procurement Policy; WAIPS; WA Buy Local Policy; the Priority Start Policy; and various environmental policies and strategies.

# WAIPS 2020 initiatives

The Premier released WAIPS 2020 on 19 November 2020 during an event that also launched the Pipeline of Work initiative.

The areas of focus for the year were:

#### » Process requirements for Agency Panel Contracts and Common Use Arrangements

Further refinements were made to the WAIPS exemption application form to include a series of questions relating to panels and CUAs, to allow more accurate assessment at the time of consideration of the agency's application. It also allows a greater overall understanding of how agencies establish and operate these forms of procurement.

#### » Agency Look Ahead Lists

These have been a focus area with agencies as they develop their WA Buy Local Implementation Agreements.

#### » Training for Regional SMEs on doing business with the state government

This program has been successfully piloted as previously detailed.

#### » Local industry participation in state grants

The first application of this new feature has been the Edith Cowan University City Campus Development.

The department has also reached agreement with the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development and the Lotteries Commission in terms of outcomes reporting for future relevant capital grants over \$5 million.

#### » Regional Strategic Projects

The WA Jobs Plan announced the stand-alone power systems as a strategic project under the WAIPS. The department will continue to work with relevant agencies to nominate suitable projects to be designated as Regional Strategic Projects.

A key point of differentiation is that a Regional Strategic Project can be designated at any value within the WAIPS thresholds. .







## Industry Link Advisory Service activity summary

During the 2020-21 financial year, the Industry Link Advisory Service (ILAS) has continued to engage across government to deliver activities that maintain the prominence of government contracting opportunities for WA businesses.

#### Government Agency engagement

Following extensive consultation with state agencies, the WA Buy Local Policy was introduced in July 2020. The policy covers procurement below the WAIPS thresholds, with the same intent of ensuring maximum use by agencies of competitive local suppliers.

ILAS officers continued dialogue with state government agencies and Government Trading Entities (GTEs) with the focus of increasing levels of local content.

#### Industry engagement

The forums provided the platform for continued engagement with regional business and industry. The forums enabled agencies to present information on their contracting models, upcoming tender opportunities and regional procurement contacts.

The Regional Development Commissions and Chambers of Commerce and Industry provided valuable support in promoting the forums among local suppliers.

ILAS has also provided guidance to businesses on how to access state and federal government financial assistance and capability building programs.

## Western Australian Industry Participation Strategy (WAIPS)

ILAS continued to promote the WAIPS to government and industry stakeholders across WA while also reviewing Participation Plans and reports related to agency contracts post award. Further advice is also provided to explain the requirements necessary to address Participation Plan obligations while also providing feedback to agencies in relation to the WAIPS.

## Local Capability Fund (LCF)

ILAS has engaged with industry associations to enhance rounds and provide even greater coverage of eligible activities that can be funded in order to assist businesses.

Since the LCF's launch in 2011 (originally the Industry Facilitation and Support Program), \$17.63 million of grant funding has been awarded to 494 Western Australian SMEs. This has resulted in 1,079 employment opportunities, 179 new apprenticeships and \$572.03 million in new contracts awarded. This represents a leverage ratio of \$77 of contracts won by Western Australian SMEs for every \$1 of LCF funding awarded.


