



Training Accreditation Council Strategic Plan

1 January 2025 - 30 June 2028

Introduction

The Training Accreditation Council (the Council) provides a contemporary, client-focused regulatory service for the vocational education and training (VET) sector in Western Australia (WA). As a state-based regulatory authority, the Council oversees the VET provider market to ensure quality outcomes and continuous improvement within the sector, and responsiveness to State priorities and risks.

The Council is an independent statutory body and its role is to assure the quality of services delivered by Registered Training Organisations (RTOs) registered with the Council and ensure that approved accredited courses meet national Standards.

This Strategic Plan (the Plan) outlines the functions, responsibilities and regulatory approach of the Council as defined by the *Vocational Education and Training Act 1996*, the *Standards for VET Regulators 2015* and the *Standards for Registered Training Organisations (RTOs) 2015*. The Plan also demonstrates how the Council will manage its responsibilities in relation to the VET Quality Reforms supported by all Australian Governments, including the revised Standards for Registered Training Organisations (revised Standards) that will be implemented during the life of the Plan.

The Plan sets out the Council's key strategic priorities, expected outcomes and strategies that will be applied throughout the period. The Plan will be reviewed annually with progress reported in the Council's annual report to the Western Australian Parliament.

Functions and responsibilities

The Council operates within a national VET regulatory framework defined in standards, guidelines and policies aimed at achieving national consistency in the registration and monitoring of RTOs and accredited courses.

The Council regulates those providers that deliver nationally recognised training to domestic students in WA, or that operate only in WA and Victoria. RTOs operating in multiple jurisdictions and/or deliver to international students are regulated by the national VET regulator, the Australian Skills Quality Authority (ASQA).

The Council's regulatory approach is designed to support RTO business improvement, compliant practices and deliver high-quality VET outcomes. Clear communication, transparent,

fair and equitable business practices, and accessible educational support and guidance are integral to the Council's regulatory approach.

The Council is committed to supporting the implementation of the national VET Quality Reforms and will ensure a strong focus on the quality assurance and continuous improvement of RTOs, and the application of student well-being strategies, as defined in the revised Standards.

The Council's primary responsibilities are as follows:

Registration	RTOs are registered by the Council in accordance with the VET regulatory framework. The Council assures the quality of training and assessment provided by RTOs, strengthening public confidence in VET in Western Australia.
Course Accreditation	Courses are accredited by the Council in accordance with the national framework for VET course accreditation. Accredited courses address industry, enterprise and the community skill requirements where they are not covered by national training packages.
Education and Guidance	The Council proactively supports the VET sector through its Education Program, providing specialised and practical professional development opportunities and guidance materials. The Council's Education Program aims to build RTO and VET practitioner capability to meet regulatory obligations and improve RTO quality assurance systems including continuous improvement.
Key VET Stakeholder	The Council undertakes a critical role in working collaboratively and extensively with State and National governments, VET regulators and other stakeholders on VET policy and regulatory matters. This strategic engagement informs and influences current and future directions of the VET sector and ensures state-based regulatory issues are prioritised.

Regulatory approach

The Council operates in accordance with the *Standards for VET Regulators 2015* and applies a regulatory approach that is transparent and responsive to the level of risk that may impact the quality of VET outcomes.

The TAC Risk Framework underpins the Council's regulatory approach and ensures its responses are evidence-based, targeted and proportionate. This approach enables the Council to direct its focus and resources to RTOs or industry sectors deemed to pose the highest risk to quality outcomes.

The Council's regulatory approach balances the need for robust regulatory oversight and risk management, with the requirement for the efficient operation of training providers and reduced regulatory burden.

The introduction of the revised Standards provides an opportunity for the Council to review its regulatory approach and risk management practices to ensure they remain fit for purpose and will continue to support the development of a skilled workforce in Western Australia.

The revised Standards have an outcomes-based focus, expand the range of requirements RTOs must meet to obtain and maintain registration, and place greater emphasis on quality, continuous improvement and student well-being in the context of an individual RTO's operating environment. The Council has taken all these factors into consideration in the development of the Plan.

The Council develops and publishes a biennial Regulatory Strategy that defines areas of focus that pose the highest risk to quality VET and the planned regulatory actions to monitor and minimise those risks. A key feature of the Strategy is the Council's commitment to an education program to encourage and promote compliance, continuous improvement and support quality outcomes.

The Council has identified four strategic priorities to meet its regulatory requirements through its own good governance, and with a focus on the compliance, quality assurance and continuous improvement of individual RTOs, and applied systemically across the VET sector.

The Council's overall strategic direction recognises the need for specific strategies to support the introduction and implementation of the revised Standards.
